Walled Garden

The Walled Garden is currently closed to the public because of covid19 but we are planning to re-open very soon. We have continued to cultivate the vegetable plots and carry out maintenance of the garden with a small number of volunteers, ensuring that we followed the full social distancing rules.

Our wild life pond has been shrinking in size over the years, mainly due to the water lilies taking so much water. We recently decided to undertake the huge task of digging out the pond and creating a smaller pond with a better water replenishment system.

Digging out the wildlife pond

Two weeks ago I had the great opportunity to start working beside the volunteers in the Walled Garden on a project to redesign the wildlife pond, which was originally built around thirty year ago.

Our first step was to remove submerged pondweed which was mainly concentrated on the edges of the pond and whose roots became caught between the pond lining and the matting. Then we proceeded to remove the water lilies which were mostly concentrated around the centre of the pond.

Like the pondweed's roots, most of the water lilies' roots were caught between the pond liner and the matting, making it significantly harder for them to be removed, especially as they were very large. The removal of the roots was a dirty job at times. The marshy conditions of the pond led some people to fall over or become stuck, as well as getting extremely muddy (which was fun). Once the water lilies and their large roots were removed, the water table had slightly risen. During the week of the heatwave the methane that was trapped in the soil below began to rise causing both the mud and the water to smell horribly.

We rescued several newts and discovered lots of slugs as well as water spiders and other insects. There were also lots of empty shells and rocks in both the soil and the matting.

The activities of the Conservation Group are focused on Fryent Country Park as well as the Walled Garden. The Park offers a beautiful countryside landscape, which gave me the opportunity to develop a close relationship with the flora and fauna of Great Britain. Helga and Liana
